

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Bynoe Puts on a Riding Clinic, Gourneau, Taphorn Win Big in Championship Races

Jockey Damario Bynoe put on a riding clinic at the Downs this week with three straight hat tricks, five-time leading trainer Jerry Gourneau won five races, and the best horses on the grounds

Bynoe Puts on a Riding Clinic, Gourneau, Taphorn Win Big in Championship Races - Assiniboia Downs delivered in spades in the two biggest championship races of the meeting.

Bynoe entered the week tied with three-time leading rider Antonio Whitehall with 40 wins each and amazingly managed to open an eight-win lead on his rival. The score is now 49-41 in favour of Bynoe, and that will be very tough for Whitehall to overcome.

And Bynoe not only won nine races, he also won the \$50,000 Manitoba Matron on Tuesday with Burrow Down (\$5.90) for trainer Mike Taphorn and owner Gerald Babchishin. The Matron marked the first time Burrow Down was ridden by Bynoe, and he gave his mount a dream trip. Burrow Down looked like her old self in the stretch, coming with a long determined rally to catch lone speed favourite Welcometohollywood late and drawing out to win by three-quarters of a length.

Burrow Down has now run 16 times at Assiniboia Downs and compiled an incredible record of 11-1-2 to bolster her overall record of 12-6-6 in 35 starts for earnings of US\$316,155. The 6-year-old daughter of Connect-True Endeavor by After Market continues to enhance her status as one of the best mares to ever race at the Downs.

Trainer Jerry Gourneau was also on a roll this week, winning five races including the \$50,000 Gold Cup on Tuesday with longshot Mr Jaws (\$21.30) for seven-time leading ASD owner Henry S. Witt, Jr. Jockey Dario Dalrymple put Mr Jaws on the lead early in the 1 1/8-mile race, but he was under steadily increasing pressure throughout, turning back multiple bids from outside rivals including favourite Judo, before being passed into the stretch on the inside by Riverside. The latter turned back multiple bids from Mr Jaws before finally succumbing to that one late, finishing second beaten a head, and 2 1/2 -lengths in front of Mr Jaws' stablemate Malibu S S.

The Gold Cup was easily one of the best races of the year at ASD, and helped Mr Jaws improve his record to 5-2-2 from 13 starts this year. The 3-year-old gelding by Bradester-Spanish Angel by Early Flyer was claimed by owner Witt for just \$7,500 on May 18 at Lonestar Park in Texas, and has easily paid for himself with a third-place finish in the Manitoba Derby and his Gold Cup win. Nicely done!

Gourneau's five wins put him third in the standings, still nine behind leader Steve Keplin, Jr, who has 35 wins, but only one win behind Mike Nault, who scored a hat trick on the week, as did trainer Wendy Anderson. Also of note on the week was jockey Sheldon Chickeness, who won three races to up his record to 3-2-2 from 12 starts since coming out of semi-retirement on September 9.

And looked good doing it.

Roger Jones Wins ASD Handicapping Challenge for Third Time

Roger Jones won the ASD Handicapping Challenge for the third time last Tuesday, and he's going to Vegas with his girlfriend and fellow contest winner Nicole Baker at the end of October to celebrate with his \$3,500 prize money.

It was the fourth overall tournament win at Assiniboia Downs for the 54-year-old bus operator, but his first win in the live contest in about eight years. It also vaulted Jones to the top of the standings in the Handicapper of the Year contest.

Jones built his bankroll to \$77.60 with a combination of mediumpriced horses and favourites to best runner-up Steve Holborn (\$70.80) by \$6.80, followed by Wayne Misko (\$64.10) and Bonnie Simmonds, who finished in a dead heat for third place.

Race-by-Race Picks

Jones's path to victory began conservatively. "The first two races, I took the favourites," he said. Both horses delivered, giving him a solid foundation. But in the third race, his strategy began separating him from the field.

Instead of playing favourite Mechanic Susie, Jones went with 15-1 Dazzling Gold, who delivered a crucial second-place finish that paid more than the winner across the board. The fourth race proved challenging, with Jones struggling to find value among uninspiring favourites. He settled on Dreamin Out Loud, who finished second, but in races five and six Jones distanced himself from the competition.

In the fifth race, Jones demonstrated his ability to adapt based on track conditions. "I actually went with the horse that I didn't originally have because I thought the track was playing a bit for speed," said Jones. His selection, It's a Fluke, trained by Monique Goulet, after being claimed and fitted with blinkers, won at 4-1.

The sixth race featured what Jones considered a standout opportunity. "From a contest standpoint, I think that around 75% of the people should have had the horse in the next race," said Jones, referring to Enano Caro. "That horse looked like it was going to get the lead and it was paying 9-1. To me, you had to take this horse."

Enano Caro's odds dropped to 7/2, but he came through with a solid win, and only 13 others in the contest had him. Entering the final race, Jones faced a strategic dilemma. While he identified a 25-1 longshot as having a good chance to win, he opted for the logical favourite Go Fer, who survived a determined challenge from the 25-1 longshot Jones liked, Pino Bambino, to secure the tournament win.

Handicapping Philosophy and Angles

Jones' success stems from decades of study. Having played horses for nearly 40 years, he's developed a sophisticated approach incorporating multiple angles. "I learned a lot from Ivan Bigg and Marshall Posner," said Jones. "I like to listen to what people say and see if it's something that fits for me."

One of Jones' favourite angles involves horses that have run well in their previous races, despite adverse circumstances "I like it when they show something when things didn't go their way," said Jones, who particularly values fourth-place finishes, noting that "people just seem to discount a horse" when they finish fourth in their previous races.

Jones also incorporates breeding analysis using pedigreequery.com and pays close attention to equipment changes like blinkers, though context matters. "Blinkers in itself isn't a positive angle," said Jones, "But if you can find a reason why the blinkers are going on, that makes a difference." An expert quarter horse handicapper, another angle Jones carried over from those runners to thoroughbreds is class. "It works with both quarter horses and thoroughbreds," said Jones.

The Value of ASD Contests

Jones is a strong advocate for Assiniboia Downs' handicapping contests, citing their positive expected value (EV). "I love the contests," he said. "It's one of the best things they have going on at the Downs here. The EV is high. I don't know why everybody doesn't play in them."


When not competing or driving people around the city, Jones works at the Fan Education Booth, on the main floor of the grandstand, helping newcomers understand handicapping basics. "A lot of people are brand new," said Jones. "But you can learn from anybody, and something new from every race you play."

Jones is looking forward to his Vegas trip with his girlfriend, which coincides with the Breeders' Cup on October 31 and November 1 at Del Mar.

He'll have all the class he needs there.

Vikings over Bengals (Sunday noon): I can't imagine anyone had Carson Wentz vs. Jake Browning on their bingo card when they saw the Week 3 matchup between the Vikings and Bengals. How did we even end up with this mess? I'm going to blame Bengals upper management for starters. If you're going to sign your franchise quarterback to a \$275 million contract, you'd

better invest in some offensive linemen to protect him—and so far, they have failed to do that.

To put it in perspective: former Colts QB Andrew Luck, who was essentially forced to retire due to taking too many hits, was sacked 157 times in his first 71 games played. Joe Burrow, in the same number of games, has been sacked a mind-boggling 201 times! No wonder he's always getting hurt.

Vikings QB J. J. McCarthy was riding quite the high after Week 1. He became a father and had a nice come-from-behind victory over the Bears. Week 2 saw him come back down to earth as he turned the ball over three times and didn't manage to lead any touchdown drives. On top of that, he has an injured ankle that will keep him out of the lineup for a few weeks. Enter Carson Wentz—the less said about him, the better. I trust the Vikings' defence way more than I trust the Bengals' defence, so they should be able to force a few turnovers, maybe even a pick-six, and get the win.

Eagles over Rams (Sunday afternoon): The Eagles handled their business once again against the Chiefs last week, albeit in a much closer and far less entertaining game compared to the Super Bowl. Jalen Hurts barely had 100 yards passing and zero touchdown passes; the team as a whole only had 216 yards of total offence. If it wasn't for Kelce dropping a touchdown in the end zone, the result could have turned out differently.

That said, their defence still looked solid, shutting down Mahomes, and they'll look to do the same thing to Matt Stafford and the Rams. A rematch of their playoff divisional meeting from last year, the Rams will try to avenge their loss and improve to 3-0 on the season. Going into Philadelphia and winning on their field is always a tough task, but if the Rams want to be taken seriously, these are the types of teams they'll have to beat.

Commanders over Raiders (Sunday noon): I'm making this pick contingent on Jayden Daniels actually playing. He suffered a knee injury last week against the Packers and his status for this week is questionable. What helps the Commanders, regardless of whether Daniels plays or not, is that the Raiders just aren't very good.

In the off-season, Vegas traded for Geno Smith and then signed him to an extension to make him their starting quarterback for the next couple of years. So far, he has one touchdown and four interceptions—three of those picks coming last week against the Chargers. If that wasn't bad enough, rookie running back Ashton Jeanty, who had quite a bit of hype entering the season, has

managed just 81 yards in two games. Not being able to throw *or* run the ball efficiently isn't going to get you many wins. It all starts up front, and the lack of run-blocking by the offensive line might be one of the reasons Jeanty is averaging only 2.7 yards per carry.
