Assiniboia Downs concluded its 2025 live racing season on a high note Wednesday night, setting a new all-time wagering record and celebrating two first-time champions.

Trainer Steve Keplin, Jr. won his first training title with 40 victories, jockey Damario Bynoe won his first championship with 60 victories, and total wagering reached \$75.2 million, setting a new track record and surpassing the previous benchmark of \$63.2 million in 2020 by an impressive \$12 million.

Thanks to our tremendous fans and the horsepeople who put on the show, wagering increased by 21.16% from the 2024 season, with the average wagering per card hitting \$1.5 million. Thank you everyone!



Assiniboia Downs Closes With Record-Breaking 2025 Season

Assiniboia Downs concluded its 2025 live racing season on a high note Wednesday night, setting a new all-time wagering record for the track and celebrating two first-time champions.

The 2025 season saw unprecedented success, with total wagering reaching \$75.2 million. This not only set a new track record but also surpassed the previous benchmark of set of \$63.2 million in 2020 by an impressive \$12 million. Total wagering increased by 21.16% from the 2024 season, with the average wagering per card hitting \$1.5 million.

Contributing to this year's success was the positive response from horseplayers to the track's customer-focused initiatives, including the strategic move in recent years to reduce all takeouts below 20%, a practice only a few North American tracks have adopted.

Closing day featured a thrilling mandatory payout of the ASD Jackpot Pick 5. The jackpot had reached over \$300,000, and an additional \$1.7 million was pumped into the pool on Wednesday, resulting in a pool of over \$2 million at post time for the third race. The payout was \$260.70 for a \$1 winning ticket.

The 2025 season was marked by two young rising stars who are now first-time champions in the jockey and trainer ranks. Damario Bynoe earned his first leading jockey title with 60 wins, 12 more than three-time ASD riding champion Antonio Whitehall, followed by Sven Balroop (36 wins), Prayven Badrie (29), and Rachaad Knights (24).

Steve Keplin, Jr. celebrated his first leading training title with 40 victories, eight more than runner-up Mike Nault (32), followed by five-time title holder Jerry Gourneau (30), Wendy Anderson (24) and Jared Brown (23).

Keplin's victory is particularly significant as it marks the 11th consecutive year that the Assiniboia Downs leading trainer title has been won by a First Nations trainer. The achievement was recognized during the closing day program by special guest Chief Murray Clearsky of Waywayseecappo First Nation, who presented the trophy to the new champion.

"What a finish this year with record wagering and the remarkable achievements from Damario and Steve Keplin Jr., both earning their first titles," said Darren Dunn, CEO of Assiniboia Downs. "We are so grateful for our growing fanbase of loyal horseplayers, the horsepeople that are giving it their all every day, and all the staff that helps to bring it all together. Thank you for another outstanding season."

The racing highlight of the season was the \$125,000 Manitoba Derby, which was won by Attack, trained by Craig Robert Smith and ridden by N'Rico Prescod for the ownership team of Smokin Guns Stable, Highfield Investment Group, Inc., Lucky Diamonds Racing, Graham, Jamie and Dialed In Racing Stable.

A massive crowd on Derby evening resulted in record-breaking wagering across the board, with \$323,267 being wagered on the Manitoba Derby, and total wagering for the evening topping \$3,974,168, setting a new Derby record at Assiniboia Downs and the second highest handle in the track's history.

Local fans were also a major highlight of the season, and attendance ontrack for the live racing was larger than we've seen in over a decade, highlighted by the fabulous success of Girls Night Out on Wednesdays during the summer. Girls Night Out will be back again next year, and we're already looking forward to opening day on Tuesday, May 12, 2026!



Rams over Ravens (Sunday noon): Being 1-4 definitely wasn't how the Ravens thought the first month of the season was going to go, but when your defense can't stop anyone, coupled with Lamar Jackson being out, getting wins won't be an easy thing. Last week they were annihilated by the Texans at home and struggled to move the ball with Cooper Rush at QB. Derek Henry has been M.I.A only rushing for 75 yard in the last two games combined, which is very unusual for him. It's one thing if your offense is garbage, but the defense has also given up 79 points in the

last two contests. Now the Rams are coming to town fresh off their upset loss to the 49ers and will be hungry to get back in the won column. I can't think of any way the Ravens win this game, so expect another blow out.

Colts over Cardinals (Sunday afternoon): The irony of these two teams playing each other after what transpired the last two weeks is not lost on me. The Cardinals shot themselves in the foot against the Titans and the Colts errored two weeks ago against the rams. If I could use expletives here I would, but it absolutely drives me insane when players STILL drop the football before crossing the goal line. It's happened twice just in the last weeks by these two very teams and it cost them wins each time. In the Cardinals case, all Emari Demercado had to do was cross the goal line and it would have put them up 28-6, game over. Instead, he was too concerned about celebrating and threw the ball aside on the 1-yard line. Cardinals coach Johnathan Gannon tore him a new one on the sideline, to the point he was fined \$100,000 for it, but in my opinion it was justified.

Two weeks ago, Colts receiver Adonai Mitchell tried celebrating early and the ball slipped out of his hand at the one-yard line, which led to a touchback instead of a touchdown. Hopefully those two goofs will learn from their mistakes, but given recent history, someone else is bound to do it again soon.

Bills over Falcons (Monday evening): The Bills were the last undefeated team heading into Sunday night, but the '72 Dolphins can once again pop the champagne now that the only undefeated season in history is still intact. Buffalo played a very sloppy game against the feisty Patriots team. Josh Allen turned the ball over a couple of times, and runningback James Cook never really got going. To his credit, Pats second year QB Drake Maye made some incredible throws on their final drive to put them in position to kick the winning field goal.

The Bills will have to shake that off and head to Atlanta who is coming off their bye week. You don't know which Falcons team is going to show up each game, the one that put up 34 points against the Commanders, or the one put up a donut against the Panthers. Either way, as good as Buffalo is, they can't take teams like this for granted because their defense isn't good enough to stop opposing offenses from moving the ball on them. They need a big statement game win here to let the NFL know they are still the team to beat.
